She then purchased a condo near the old neighborhood and took a job with a company that just happened to be located at the end of the street where she and Eddie had their home. Josie worked for that company until just a bit before her 83rd birthday. After retirement she kept busy with her weekly Tai chi classes at the local rec center and spent the better part of her weeks on any one of the many Milwaukee County golf courses with her Senior League. Then, just after her 89th birthday everything changed.

Josie had experienced a fall in her home, creating a much more sedentary lifestyle than usual. Unknowingly, pneumonia had set in and one January day she dialed 911. This led to a stay in the hospital with rehab to follow. She knew in her heart that going home was not an option and it was time to have the support offered at an assisted living community. There she could focus on the things that mattered most in her life, her Faith, exercise, meeting new people and of course puzzles! She quickly obtained the title of "Puzzle Queen" often having the staff to keep the lights on a bit later so she could finish. Even the mailman couldn't resist trying to get at least one piece placed when she was there working during his daily route. She very much enjoyed her time spent in her community, until she fell ill. Josie passed December 18th 2018, at the age of 93.
